Passive

Active Passive

A person or a thing performs the action. The object becomes the subject.

ERIC STEALS A CAR. THE CAR IS STOLEN BY ERIC.

How to build the passive form:

a form of to be + past participle

(The tense of 'to be' in the passive sentence should reflect the tense of the verb in the active sentence. Here the verb 'to steal' is in the present tense. Therefore, the form of 'to be' in the passive sentence should also be in the present tense.)

Tenses:

Present is/are stolen
Past was/were stolen
Present Perfect has/have been stolen
Future will be stolen

Present tense

Type of sentence	Subject	Verb	Object
Active	Eric	steals	a car
Passive	A car	is stolen	by Eric

Past tense

Type of sentence	Subject	Verb	Object
Active	Eric	stole	a car
Passive	A car	was stolen	by Eric



Present Perfect

Type of sentence	Subject	Verb	Object
Active	Eric	has stolen	a car.
Passive	A car	has been stolen	by Eric

Future

Type of sentence	Subject	Verb	Object
Active	Eric	will steal	a car
Passive	A car	will be stolen	by Eric
